The **Vikings Skiffle Group** perform regularly in the Museum of Liverpool by the Pier Head. The picture shows us in the Atrium where we entertain locals and tourists to the skiffle music of the late 50s and early 60s. This music, spearheaded by the King of Skiffle, Lonnie Donegan, inspired lots of teenagers to form skiffle groups, and this then led on to the beat groups and pop groups of the 60s. The Beatles started out as the Quarrymen Skiffle Group, formed by John Lennon at Quarry Bank School.

When we play at the museum we hand out various percussion instruments, mainly to the children, who love to join in with this enthusiastic music. Last year a boy who was visiting Liverpool with his grandparents was very taken with us and spent lots of time with the group. When he returned home he decided to set up a skiffle group at his

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special school. In due course a tea chest bass, washboard and various percussion instruments were got together and along with a guitar and banjo and the necessary performers and singers, the skiffle group was formed. They performed for Children in Need, were very well received by pupils and parents, and raised nearly £200. He hopes to come and see us again this year.

The **Outings Group** set out from Cross Green on a bright morning - our destination the ancient Roman city of Chester. After a smooth journey we arrived at the Mill Hotel Spa in the centre of the City. We were greeted in a welcoming fashion and served tea/coffee in a comfortable bar/dining area. This gave us time for friendly chats and an opportunity to notice the brightly painted narrow boats gliding along the adjacent Shropshire Union Canal. We were then guided to our own dining boat for the forthcoming restaurant cruise. The dining area was beautifully prepared with tables set with snowy white linen table cloths, napkins and sparkling wine glasses and cutlery. Following pre-lunch drinks, our Captain came aboard to outline details of our trip. He soon had us even more relaxed and smiling with his witticisms and he also provided some both necessary (safety) and interesting information. We learned that the Canal (or the "Shroppie" as it is affectionately called) was constructed by vertical cutting of the local red sandstone and is only a mere 4.5ft deep in parts. This was commenced as long ago as 1774 and the waterway was later amalgamated with other canals to form the Union. We were advised that it would be possible to alight from the boat (under guidance) if desired for a few minutes on the first leg of the trip and some of our members took advantage of this offer.

The menu for the four course meal was wide and varied. "Starters" were consumed while sailing in a selected direction down the Canal. We then glided back to the Hotel where our pre-ordered delicious main meal and desserts were collected (all food is prepared in the hotel kitchens). Service was impeccable. Next was a short sail in the opposite direction whilst enjoying our chosen food, taking time also to notice the magnificent sandstone city walls which made a



beautiful picture, especially with the spring yellow daffodils carpeting the slopes beneath them. The afternoon continued with a trip to the local Grosvenor shopping mall - time for "retail therapy," browsing or just enjoying a coffee and watching the world go by.

Our driver collected us and we arrived back at Formby at about 5:15pm after another comfortable journey. This was a very happy day out enjoyed by all. Many thanks to Ann for her superb arrangements and to our careful, considerate driver.

We all had Gammon, Egg and chips with peas, followed by a very generous portion of Sticky Toffee Pudding with Ice Cream.

The gardens at the hotel stretch down to Coniston Water and after lunch we were supposed to stroll through the gardens to the hotel's private jetty, to board the launch for a lovely cruise on beautiful Coniston Water. However, during lunch the Coniston Cruise Company phoned Ann to advise her that gales were forecast for the afternoon and they would have to cancel our cruise. Undaunted, Ann phoned the Windermere Cruise Company and they were still sailing because their boats are larger. Ann discussed the new itinerary with the driver, Billy, who agreed to the changes, so after

lunch he drove us all to Ambleside for our 30 minute sail to Bowness.

By this time it had stopped raining, so we boarded Miss Lakeland at 14:50 and I think we had the boat to ourselves. Needless to say, no-one braved the Upper Deck and it was nice and warm inside. We had a personal commentary from a crew member, beginning with the safety warning. He told us the advantage of having only 17 passengers on this large boat was that should the worst happen, we would have six life jackets each! This was very reassuring!



We heard that Windermere is England's largest lake, being ten and a half miles long and a mile and a quarter across at its widest point, where there used to be a car ferry. Windermere is fed by four rivers. We saw Wray Castle, a few intrepid walkers, some ducks and some swans. We also had lovely views of the surrounding mountains, especially looking back towards Ambleside. Only the tops of the fells were hidden in cloud. We arrived at Bowness Pier and had just over an hour to enjoy a drink or browse around the shops before travelling back to Formby.

Our day out to the Lake District was lovely despite the inclement weather. Ann Blackman, who organizes these excellent trips showed her ability to think on her feet, quickly arranging alternatives when things start to go wrong, making sure we all have a lovely and interesting day out. Well done Ann! On behalf of everyone, I would like to thank you. I know you have several more outings planned for this year and we will look forward to going on some of them too!
